Editor's Choice

UNACCUSTOMED EARTH, by Jhumpa Lahiri. (Knopf, \$25.) In eight sensitive stories, Lahiri evokes the anxiety, excitement and transformations felt by Bengali immigrants and their American children.

FIDELITY, by Grace Paley. (Farrar, Straus & Giroux, \$20.) In her final book, Paley, who died last August, offers a touching view of what it is to be old and sick, and missing one's friends, yet unwilling to part with life.

PARENTING, INC.: How We Are Sold on \$800 Strollers, Fetal Education, Baby Sign Language, Sleeping Coaches, Toddler Couture, and Diaper Wipe Warmers — and What It Means for Our Children. (Times Books/Holt, \$25.) An occasionally scary account.

RECONCILIATION: Islam, Democracy, and the West, by Benazir Bhutto. (Harper/HarperCollins, \$27.95.) In this posthumous book, Bhutto advances a stirring modern interpretation of the Muslim world.

PLEASE DON'T REMAIN CALM: Provocations and Commentaries, by Michael Kinsley. (Norton, \$25.95.) Kinsley, decamped to Washington State from Washington, D.C., skewers the antics of the nation's capital with the sharp focus of an outsider.

BLOOD KIN, by Ceridwen Dovey. (Viking, \$23.95.) Power and sadism are the themes of this first novel, which imagines a military coup as seen by the deposed president's portraitist, chef and barber.

THE OPEN ROAD: The Global Journey of the Fourteenth Dalai Lama, by Pico Iyer. (Knopf, \$24.) Iyer lays out the many paradoxes of a figure he considers one of the best- and least-known people on the planet.

SEA CHANGE: Poems, by Jorie Graham. (Ecco/ HarperCollins, \$23.95.) Like Graham's strongest earlier books, this collection is by turns vexing and alluring.

THE CRAFTSMAN, by Richard Sennett. (Yale University, \$27.50.) An inquiring, intelligent look at how the work of the hand informs the work of the mind.

Paperback Row

THE ECHOING GREEN: The Untold Story of Bobby Thomson, Ralph Branca and the Shot Heard Round the World, by Joshua Prager. (Vintage, \$15.95.) The story broke in The Wall Street Journal in 2001: The New York Giants' historic comeback at the end of the 1951 season, capped by Bobby Thomson's famous home run in Game 3 of the playoffs, was powered by their theft of the signals of opposing catchers. Here Prager expands his original research into the mechanics of the scheme — a telescope hidden behind the mesh grid of a clubhouse window in the Polo Grounds — but he focuses on the lifelong effects of the secret on Thomson and the Dodgers' pitcher Ralph Branca. The book is "a revelation and a page turner," John Thorn wrote in the Book Review.

THE MISTRESS'S DAUGHTER, by A.M. Homes. (Penguin, \$14.) When she was 31, Homes, a novelist, learned that the woman who had given her up for adoption was looking for her. "In my dreams, my birth mother is ... beautiful, incredibly competent," Homes writes in this fascinating memoir. The reality was very different: her biological mother was incredibly needy, and her biological father demanded a DNA test. As a "document of a flawed, incoherent self," the book is "fierce and eloquent," our reviewer, Katie Roiphe, said.

THE LAST MUGHAL. The Fall of a Dynasty: Delhi, 1857, by William Dalrymple. (Vintage, \$16.95.) Drawing on accounts — never before used by historians — from Delhi residents who survived the Great Mutiny of 1857, Dalrymple examines the collapse of relations between the British and their Indian subjects. He structures his narrative around the life of Zafar, the poet and Sufi mystic who became the uprising's figurehead monarch. The contradictions and inequalities of contemporary India are the subject of IN SPITE OF THE GODS: The Rise of Modern India,

by Edward Luce (Anchor, \$14.95), who spent five years in New Delhi as a reporter for The Financial Times.

THE FIRST MAN-MADE MAN: The Story of Two Sex Changes, One Love Affair, and a Twentieth-Century Medical Revolution, by

Pagan Kennedy. (Bloomsbury, \$14.95.) Part biography, part medical history, this book tells the story of a British woman who, with the help of testosterone and 13 operations, became a man. Harold Gillies, the doctor who effected the transformation, almost steals the show in Kennedy's account of his pioneering plastic surgery.

ALEXIS DE TOCQUEVILLE: A Life, by Hugh Brogan. (Yale University, \$20.) This first full-scale biography in English was written by a British historian with a deep knowledge of 19th-century French politics and an accessible style. Brogan situates Tocqueville in his aristocratic milieu and shows the influences on his thinking before he set out on the nine-month journey that resulted in the two volumes of "Democracy in America." Tocqueville later helped draft the constitution of France's second republic and was for a time its foreign minister. In Brogan's hands, his life "is always a pulsing intellectual and political drama," Christopher Caldwell wrote in the Book Review.

THE FEMININE MISTAKE: Are We Giving Up Too Much? by Leslie Bennetts. (Voice/Hyperion, \$15.95.) Bennetts seeks to shift the debate about work and motherhood from family values to economics, arguing that opting out of the work force to raise children is a serious error for women. Another set of questions about work is raised by Sara Davidson in LEAP! What Will We Do With the Rest of Our Lives? (Ballantine, \$15). Davidson interviews aging boomers

trying to find meaning as their work lives wind down.

THOMAS HARDY, by Claire Tomalin. (Penguin, \$17.) "This book is about how Hardy became a writer, poet and novelist," Tomalin begins, and she shows the effect of class on Hardy's effort to pursue his ambitions. Her biography is "a fascinating case study in mid-Victorian literary sociology," our reviewer, Thomas Mallon, said.

THE MINISTRY OF SPECIAL CASES, by Natham Englander. (Random House, \$13.95.) Englander's first novel is set in Buenos Aires in 1976 at the beginning of Argentina's "Dirty War." When a Jewish couple's college-age son is seized by the police, his parents must appeal to a Kafkaesque Ministry of Special Cases. Englander's Argentina is a mythological place, presided over by the spirit of Isaac Bashevis Singer.

MEDICAL APARTHEID: The Dark History of Medical Experimentation on Black Americans From Colonial Times to the Present, by Harriet A. Washington. (Harlem Moon/Broadway, \$15.95.) Washington documents the history of medical research involving black Americans; the book recently won the National Book Critics Circle Award for nonfiction.

UNCERTAINTY: Einstein, Heisenberg, Bohr, and the Struggle for the Soul of Science, by David Lindley. (Anchor, \$14.95.) This account of the development and impact of the uncertainty principle "provides a useful précis of the mind-blowing progress of physics in the early 20th century," Janet Maslin wrote in The Times.
